c. Geopolitical analysis

For decades, Colombia has been affected by a protracted conflict between the national government, the insurgent groups Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia (FARC), National Liberation Army (ELN) and a number of criminal organizations. In 2016, after more than 50 years of conflict, the Government of Colombia signed a peace agreement with the country's largest guerrilla group, the FARC. However, several other armed groups remain active across the country, causing deterioration of the security conditions in the country's most remote areas, and civilians continue to suffer the humanitarian consequences of the ongoing violence. Colombia also shelters around 1.1 million Venezuelans who have left their country.

Due to the ongoing violence, humanitarian needs were on the rise in 2018, with an 89 percent increase in the number of civilians forcibly displaced by armed violence. Colombia has the largest number of internally displaced people with over 7.4 million registered in the country. Additionally, over 360,000 Colombian refugees have sought refuge in neighbouring countries and need protection. In addition, the unfolding crisis in Venezuela and consequent population displacement into Colombia is an issue of concern: over one million Venezuelans are registered in Colombia, and they often live in situations of extreme vulnerability.

There are still many gaps in accessing health insurance, healthcare, physical rehabilitation services and humanitarian assistance.



Summary of HI presence in the country

HI has been working in Colombia since 1998, with an emergency response to the Armero landslide, and has had a permanent presence in the country since 2004. In Colombia, HI promotes respect for the rights of people with disabilities with a special focus on improvised landmine and ERW victims and their families. HI also responds to the rehabilitation and mental health needs in the context of the Venezuelan migrant crisis. HI Colombia currently focuses on seven areas of intervention: physical and functional rehabilitation, mental health and psychosocial support, economic inclusion, community protection mechanisms, humanitarian demining, land release, risk education and disaster risk reduction and climate change adaptation. Moreover, the organization strives to empower people with disabilities in the design and implementation of public policies (advocacy and capacity building for inclusive governance).

Over the past 16 years, HI has teamed up with more than 5 local partners and grassroots organisations in over 10 departments within the country, thereby gaining first-hand understanding of the needs of the most vulnerable whilst consolidating acceptance from all parties.

The implementation of these actions helps create favourable conditions for the participation of beneficiaries in socioeconomic development of their communities and a safer territory prone to sustainable development.
